

Honoring One of Our Own

On Thursday, May 5th the Summit County Sheriff's Office Honor Guard joined law enforcement from throughout the state at the Ohio Peace Officers Memorial Ceremony in London, Ohio to honor those who died in the line of duty over the past year, and to posthumously honor one of our own whose story was nearly lost to time.

The name of Summit County Sheriff's Deputy Rex Faux (1904–1933) was added to the Fallen Officers Memorial Wall. Deputy Faux died on duty in 1933 when the steering mechanism in his patrol car failed as he was returning from a call in Northfield. His name now joins those from throughout Ohio whose "end of watch" came all too soon.













Summit County Sheriff's Office to receive largest portion of Violent Crime Reduction Grant

In April, Ohio Governor Mike DeWine announced the recipients of more than \$3.7 million in grant money to local law enforcement agencies to combat violent crime in their communities. The governor's announcement contained 21 police departments and sheriff's offices throughout the state, with the Summit County Sheriff's Office topping the award list at \$421,241.

"This money will be instrumental in our ongoing efforts and planned initiatives to fight violent crime throughout our county, and it will help make our streets safer for those in law enforcement," said Sheriff Fatheree. "I appreciate the state's support in helping us to ensure that Summit County remains a safe place to live, work, and raise a family."

The General Assembly and Governor created the Ohio Violent Crime Reduction Program to provide additional resources to law enforcement to tackle the recent uptick in violent crime throughout the state. The initial \$8 million in funds received a significant boost from the federal government's 2021 American Rescue Plan Act, increasing the total funds available to \$58 million to be doled out over the coming months.







In April, Attorney General Dave Yost named The University of Akron/Summit County Sheriff's Police Academy a STAR Police Training Academy. Only around 15% of academies in the state earn this prestigious accreditation. As part of the application process, our Academy underwent a rigorous review of its policies, performance, and outcomes, conducted by the Ohio Peace Officer Training Academy.

THE SUMMIT COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE MOUNTED UNIT WAS ESTABLISHED IN 1953. IT WAS ORIGINALLY DESIGNED TO SERVE A CEREMONIAL PURPOSE, BUT IN THE 1990S IT ALSO TOOK ON LAW ENFORCEMENT DUTIES. TODAY, IT IS ONE OF THE MOST SOUGHT-AFTER MOUNTED UNITS IN THE STATE.

THE UNIT OPERATES AS A 501 (C)(3) NON-PROFIT ORGANIZATION. ALL HORSES ARE PRIVATELY OWNED BY THEIR RIDERS, WHO CONSIST OF FULL-TIME DEPUTIES, SPECIAL DEPUTIES, AND AUXILIARY MEMBERS. IN ADDITION TO SERVING SUMMIT COUNTY, THEY ARE REGULARLY CALLED UPON TO TRAIN OTHER UNITS, AND TO KEEP THE PEACE AT EVENTS AND DEMONSTRATIONS THROUGHOUT THE STATE OF OHIO.





Horses and riders train on an obstacle course that presents a number of challenges for both to overcome, including accurate shooting, pushing barriers, passing blindly through obstacles, walking over uneven terrain, climbing, and crowd control techniques.









Outdoor activities include acclimation to things like flares, raucous crowds, emergency sirens, and helicopters. Despite the mud, noise, and wind, our team performed fantastically during a landing and takeoff executed by the University Hospitals medical helicopter.

In May, the Summit County Sheriff's Office had another first! Two of our inmates were presented with certificates upon completing the IN2WORK program, a partnership between the SCSO and Aramark. In this program, "trusty" inmates spend six weeks working in the jail's kitchen, learning the ins and outs of food prep, kitchen maintenance, food safety, and more, which increases their odds of finding gainful employment upon their release. We have already had local restaurants approach us that are interested in hiring them! Programs and partnerships like these are crucial to helping reduce recidivism rates in our jail, and in jails and prisons throughout the country. We congratulate our inmates on their certifications and wish them luck in their future as they complete their sentences and turn the page on this chapter in their lives.
